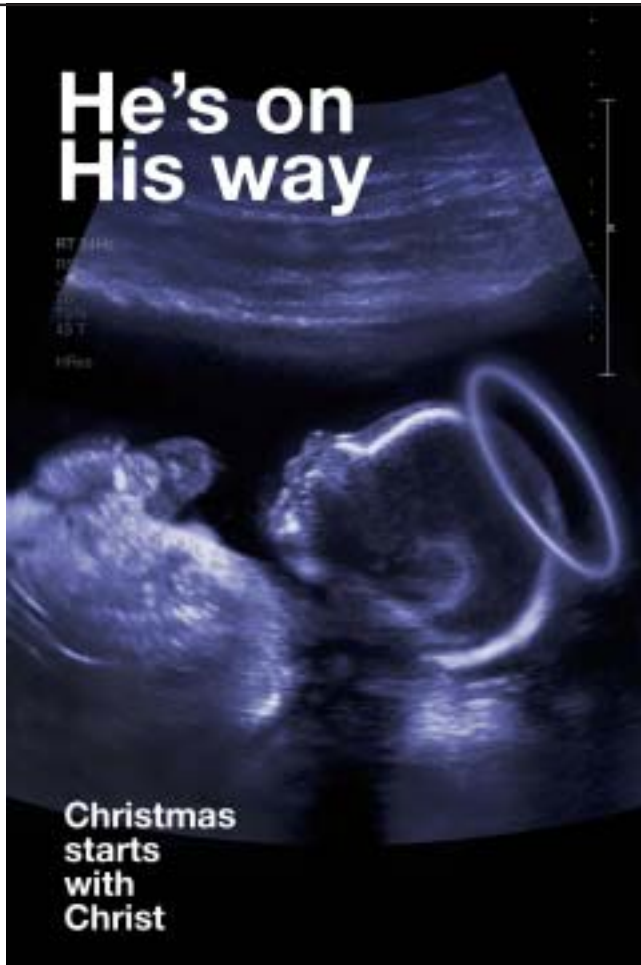

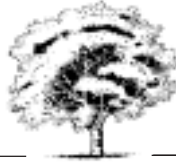

COUNTRY MATTERS

THE FOOD PRODUCER AND HIS SIDEKICK

As the year draws to a close, I have been reflecting on how much of my life revolves around food, not just the growing, cooking and eating of it, or even the shopping for it. Aside from these obvious things, food touches my life in many other ways.

I am regularly involved with activities that are related to food production whenever I assist Will with any type of farm work. These activities can be quite relaxing, such as counting the cows and calves in the home field when I am enjoying my morning walk with the dogs before breakfast, or driving off in the truck to fetch a machinery part while Will wrestles with the broken machine, removing the offending bit

that is causing the problem. I quite enjoy these trips, as I can listen to my favourite music and sing to my heart's content without being asked if I want it to rain! Then there are the times that I have to don my boiler suit, grab my stick and go out and help move cattle about.

A trip to Melton Market is usually followed by such a mini rodeo, as several pens of weaned gangly young stock are moved across the yard from the calf shed into the barn where they have lots more space, the vacated pens then being filled with baby calves purchased in the market. The boiler suit is very unflattering, but it serves to keep me warm, dry and clean. Cattle of

all sizes tend to act like unruly children once let loose in the yard, and we are usually ankle deep in sloppy manure as we endeavour to get them to move in the direction we want them to go! Being splattered with cow muck is a distinct possibility.

During harvest time and through to drilling time, I seem to have been performing a regular shuttle service either fetching Will back home from a field for his dinner and taking him back again, or ferrying him around from field to field as he moves about the various tractors and equipment that he needs for the job. Many of these different activities can happen at random times of the day, so to keep control of my own work and leisure I have to quiz Will as to when he might need me. I have to impress on him that it is no good ringing me at certain times as I shall be in my treatment room, relaxing music playing, candles burning, and a pair of feet in my hands. Then there are the times when I

start to get food out of the freezer at breakfast and assemble vegetables together for midday dinner. Will comes in at ten o'clock and announces a change of plan, and instead of dinner he needs cobs to take up the field. So meat goes back into the freezer and cobs are hurriedly defrosted, filled and bundled into a carrier bag quickly, along with a couple of cakes ready for him to take up the field.

This may sound very frustrating having to alter mealtimes about with little notice, but I have been doing this for so long that it seems quite normal to me. Anyway life is never boring, and we often have unexpected days out together like a trip to Wales to buy a new dog or out to the east coast to look at a new stock bull, usually with a pub lunch thrown in. Will thinks me and my map are preferable to a sat nav and I love the opportunity to go out with him for the day. I hope next year is as varied and exciting as the last.

Diseworth Millennium Meadow



The Millennium Meadow is available for use by all inhabitants of Diseworth and Long Whatton at any time. It is the perfect place for a quiet stroll, especially in an evening or very early in the morning. The grass was cut in early September and has grown back well after all the rain. All the trees are thriving and some are now quite an impressive size. We are still planting a few trees each year, mostly smaller or shrubby species to provide infill and undergrowth. We also have a number of previously planted trees as yet without sponsors, so would welcome any enquiries. 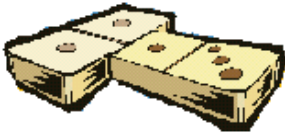

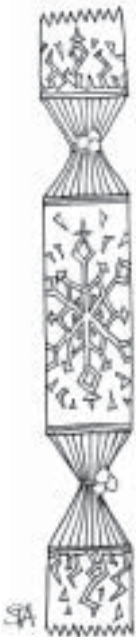

LONG WHATTON & DISEWORTH PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



The Agenda for the November Council meeting was quite short but some significant decisions were made. Representatives from East Midlands Airport told us the Airport would be hosting the East Midlands live Children in Need event and asking us to help with the publicity (*this has been circulated via our Village.Mail service, to which anyone can easily subscribe*).

Diseworth Village Hall Committee had asked for help with the problem of dog owners allowing their dogs to foul the Village Hall land where children play. The Council wished to help but always calls in the District Council on street cleaning matters as we don't have our own resources. Councillors thought that the best strategy would be to simply ask local dog owners to **"Please don't allow your dog to foul public land, especially where children play"**. In the Village Hall grounds it was suggested to the Committee that some signs carrying this message might achieve the desired effect.

It was agreed to respond again to the annual appeal to make a donation for the purchase of a 'Pride' victim of crime alarm for the Parish.

Long Whatton Councillors raised concerns about the current plight of **Long Whatton News** which was now appealing for volunteers to help out the current editor. It was agreed that the publication was a very important feature of village life which now needed a re-launch with a new group of

volunteers to take it forward. It was decided that the Parish Council should make the offer to take the initiative to call a public meeting to which all interested parties would be invited. The whole question could then be discussed with a view to securing a satisfactory future for the News.

While the necessary legal procedures for the acquisition of the **Allotments** at Diseworth were making their ponderous progress towards completion, hopefully in January, a very constructive meeting had been held recently with prospective allotment holders. This had discussed the arrangements for tenancy and management in detail. It had been agreed that the day-to-day management would be in the hands of a new Allotments Working Group to which all tenants and councillors could belong. The Council now formally approved these arrangements enabling the new Group to carry out real preparations with a view to making a start in January. Anyone in the Parish is welcome to ask the Parish Clerk for information about the availability of allotments.

It was agreed that the play equipment at the Diseworth Play Area was in need of a re-paint. This would be arranged.

The results of the survey by County Highways for the provision of salt bins had now been received. The five bins proposed would cost the Parish Council £1000 but would be filled by County Highways subject to their resources. It was agreed to go forward with this. It was then necessary to consult with local residents but it was

hoped, despite the long delays, to get the bins installed before Winter.

It was decided to respond to the current Transportation Survey with comments about the loss of the evening bus service and agreed the Council should again be involved with the Long Whatton Christmas Tree Festival.

HEALTH PAGE

HAVE A HEALTHY CHRISTMAS DINNER



We tend to think that Christmas is a time of rich unhealthy foods that will make us fat, but the foods that go into the traditional Christmas dinner do have many health giving qualities. Turkey is a low fat meat and an excellent source of all the B vitamins, especially B12. It is a good source of potassium and phosphorus, and contains over one third more zinc than the equivalent weight of chicken. It also contains tryptophan, which is a component of a soothing neurotransmitter called serotonin. Serotonin is required for normal sleep and may also play a role in controlling depression.

Chestnuts are low in fat but the fat they do contain is unsaturated and packed with essential fatty acids that are important for normal tissue growth and development. Cranberries can help to prevent urinary tract infections and are a good source of Vitamin C. They are packed with antioxidants that can help to protect us from heart disease and cancer. The herbs sage and thyme help the digestion of rich heavy food and calm indigestion. Onions cooked and raw seem to protect against the harmful effects of fatty foods on the blood. They appear to contain a substance that helps to prevent the blood clotting and may increase the rate at which clots are broken down. Peas are a low calorie food and 65g of frozen peas supplies a quarter of the daily requirement of Vitamin C and half the thiamine. Peas are also a good source of folate, fibre and phosphorus.

Last but by no means least we have the Brussels sprouts. Renowned for their ability to produce intestinal wind, they are nonetheless a powerful ally in helping to prevent two types of cancer. Brussels sprouts and other cruciferous vegetables contain nitrogen compounds called indoles, which are thought to reduce the risk of breast and intestinal cancers. Some types of breast cancer are linked to high levels of oestrogen in the body. These indoles stimulate the liver to break down the oestrogen faster. Research shows that by accelerating oestrogen's metabolism and speeding up it's elimination from the body; less of the hormone is available for any potential cancer to feed on. Women who metabolise oestrogen rapidly are thought to be at reduced risk of breast and uterus cancer. Sprouts also seem to protect against bowel and stomach cancer. So what's a bit of intestinal wind between friends and family!!

So Christmas dinner seems to be a healthier meal than its image might suggest, so tuck in and enjoy!
